Tornado takes to the main line for testing

The next phase of testing for 'A1' Pacific No. 60163 commences the week, as the locomotive works a series of engine and support coach and loaded test trains from York.

Having undergone several weeks of testing and mileage accumulation on the Great Central Railway, the locomotive moved to York in late October and having been unloaded at the Holgate depot of Network Rail, the 'AI' turned its first wheels on the National Network when it was dragged across to the NRM by Class 08 No. 08911 *Matey* and DRS Class 37/6 No. 37602.

Unfortunately for photographers, all three of the mainline test runs will take place under the cover of darkness, as this is the only time that suitable paths could be provided.

The first run, is an engine and support coach trip from the NRM to Scarborough and back on Tuesday 4th November, departing York at 18.59, arriving Scarborough at 20.12 and returning at 22.15 after being turned. Two days later, and the first of the loaded test runs operating up to 60 mph takes place, with a triangular run from the NRM to Sheffield,

then to Barrow Hill and back to York. This trip will depart from York at 19.49, running via Milford Junction (20.14 to 20.34), Moorthorpe and Sheffield (21.47 to 22.05, to run-round) arriving Barrow Hill at 23.10 and departing again at 00.27 to York, arriving back at 02.31. The final run will see the locomotive working at up to its current maximum speed of 75mph from York northwards to Tyne Yard on 18th November. The train will depart from York Holgate Sidings at 18.56 and uses the freight avoiding lines to head north, passing Northallerton at 19.29 and Durham at 20.01. At Tyne Yard the locomotive will take water and be turned on the triangle linking the ECML with the Tyne Valley line, before returning at 22.53 to York, arriving 00.39. The AI Locomotive Trust is still hopeful of achieving main line certification for the 90mph running, but understandably, this is something that will be approached after several months of standard mainline operation, having settled the locomotive in and having gained mainline experience. The team at Railway Herald wish the AI Locomotive Trust well and we will have a special report on the final stages of the 'Als' mainline certification in the new year.

outshopped for EMT

The first of East Midlands Trains' fleet of 25 Class 158/0s to be refurbished was shown at Derby on 31st October.

The work on No. 158783 was carried out by DeltaRail at the Derby Railway Technical Centre and has been given the same East Midlands livery as the Class 222 Meridians.

In addition to the new colours, internal refurbishment includes new seats, new toilets, the introduction of CCTV and installation of a passenger

counting device that allows passenger loading to be monitored automatically. Improved air conditioning units are being fitted where necessary to the majority of the fleet and there are modifications to various other systems to provide improved reliability.

The units are used primarily on Liverpool-Norwich services, via Manchester, Sheffield and Nottingham and including the foyer tip-up seats, the refurbished '158s' now have 158 seats!

£20 million upgrade for Etches Park

East Midlands Trains (EMT) has announced that it has awarded a contract to carry out a £20 million upgrade to its Derby Etches Park Depot.

The contract has been awarded to C. Spencer Limited, a North Lincolnshire based company, and work is expected to start on 3rd November and is scheduled for completion by early 2010.

Two brand new train maintenance sheds are to be constructed, predominantly used to maintain the company's 'Meridian' fleet. At the same time a major upgrade of the existing maintenance shed will take place to improve the efficiency of the depot in maintaining the rest of the EMT fleet and provide much better staff facilities. The specific work to be undertaken includes construction of a new 180-metre long, three road, train maintenance shed, including new stores, office accommodation and staff facilities, installation of under-frame wash and extract ventilation facilities and refurbishment of the operational staff accommodation facilities in the existing train maintenance depot and construction of a new wheel lathe facility.

A further contract is to be awarded on the back of the main contract for a new fuelling and inspection point.

Quiet coach enforcement on c2c routes

c2c is trialing a new device on its services between London – Tilbury/Shoeburyness whereby windows in 'quiet' carriages will be covered with a film that jams mobile phone signals.

Light can still pass through, but Wi-Fi, radio and phone signals are blocked. The transparent coating, made of a combination of metals, plastics and chemicals, was developed in America to stop wireless communications being hijacked.

One out of every four carriages on c2c trains is already a designated quiet zone where phones and other electronic

gadgets are banned, but the company has taken action amid complaints that some passengers are flouting the noise ban. Certain jamming devices are illegal to operate, but the coating used by c2c is lawful because passengers who sit in quiet carriages agree to terms and conditions.

Rain, hale and snow ... but which is the odd-one out!

Severe flooding near Hele Bradninch has led to the suspension of all rail services between Exeter St. Davids and Tiverton Parkway stations, affecting rail passengers travelling with First Great Western and Arriva Cross Country.

The level crossing is also closed to traffic and pedestrians. Lines will remain closed until the weather conditions stabilise, allowing to make any immediate and essential repair to be carried out. The railway track is two-feet under water, making it impossible for

engineers to determine the areas and scale of damage at this stage.

Chris Rayner, Route Infrastructure Maintenance Director, Network Rail said: "Our people are working as hard and as quickly as possible to deal with the effects of this extreme weather. The atrocious conditions are currently hampering work but we are monitoring the situation closely. We look to start repair work as soon as the condition stabilises and bring the track back up."

Cars to Belgium as new automotive terminal opens

New Transport Minister, Lord Andrew Adonis, opened the new Keypoint Swindon rail terminal on 31st October.

The terminal is designed to help tackle local congestion and substantially reduce carbon dioxide. It will transport some 23,000 vehicles each year from the Honda factory to the Channel Tunnel, meaning almost 3,000 fewer transporters on the roads. The new terminal will allow Honda to export cars from its Swindon plant to the European logistics centre

in Gent, Belgium. The terminal links directly to the Honda facility, and has been developed jointly between Honda and Kilbride Group.

Up to two trains a week will run from the terminal, each carrying over 200 cars, mostly 5-door and 3-door hatchback Civic models. Honda (UK) already transports cars to Newcastle and Scotland by rail, via Bristol. The new service leaves Swindon at around 16.00 and arrives at Gent at 07.00 the next morning.

- A cost-cutting proposal by Northern Ireland Railways could mean the end of Sunday train services. The Department of Regional Development, which funds the system, is seeking extra funds to prevent cutbacks amid rising fuel bills and maintenance costs. If this funding is not provided, one scenario would see Sunday train services being stopped and possibly a cessation of services after 22.00. Translink has said that it had no plans at the present time to curtail services, but it remained under constant financial pressure and would keep its plans under review.
- Leasing company Porterbrook is to be sold by Abbey National to a consortium that includes Antin Infrastructure Partners, Deutsche Bank and Lloyds TSB, the value of the transaction said to be in the region of £2 billion. About 5,500 rail vehicles are involved. Abbey National is owned by Banco Santander of Spain and the deal is likely to be as a result of the world banking problems, allowing Santander to bolster its capital base. The sale is subject to the usual regulatory approval, but should be completed before the end of this year. This is the second rail leasing company sale, Angel Trains having been sold by Halifax Bank of Scotland earlier this year to a consortium led by Babcock & Brown. It seems likely that Great Britain's third ROSCo, HSBC Rail, is also likely to end up in new hands as it is reported that the bank has appointed two sets of advisers as a preliminary to an auction.
- New ticket gates at Leeds costing £1.6 million went live on 26th October. The 25 automatic gates have replaced the existing ticket booths, improving access and making it easier for passengers to travel through the station. The new gates will accept MetroCards.
- Network Rail has announced that it intends to build its new national headquarters in Milton Keynes. The company has signed an agreement with Milton Keynes Partnership, which will allow it to begin construction work on the site of the town's National Hockey Stadium. Details have yet to be finalised for the project, but developments are set to be completed in spring next year.
- ❖ A company called E-Rail is endeavouring to reopen the Edinburgh south-suburban rail line, which would link Gorgie, Morningside and Craigmillar with Waverley and Haymarket stations. It says that the project could act as a blueprint for future transport projects across Scotland and has already attracted £8.5 million from landowners along the proposed

New Ramsgate depot opens

The new Southeastern Depot in Ramsgate has been opened, the facility securing 160 jobs.

It has taken 18 months to construct, at a cost of £35 million and mainly looks after the Class 375 Electrostar EMUs, but will have overnight capacity to store the new Class 395 'Javelin' units. The new train care facility has a bogey drop and five elevated/ pitted inspection roads with seven 12-car sidings. A rail vehicle transfer unit has also been built to accept lorry deliveries of trains/ tampers/ cranes and the like, and a trainwash is also installed. The old Ramsgate Depot was cleared of existing track some 18 months ago to allow the new facility to be constructed.

Wymondham students win award in partnership with National Express

An engineering project set up by
National Express East Anglia (NXEA) and
Wymondham High School has reached the
finals of the Eastern Daily Press Business
Awards, where the project was short listed
for the Industry Partnership Award. Sixth
form students from Wymondham High School
worked in partnership with the engineering
fleet team at Crown Point Depot, Norwich, as
part of an engineering education scheme.

The four students worked on a project to come up with a solution to improve the reliability of the air-operated internal doors

on the Mk3 coaches that operate between Norwich and London Liverpool Street. The solution involved adjustments to the operation of the doors through the development of an electrical box and replacement of relays to regulate the automatic movement of the doors more consistently.

The prototype was built by the students and fitted to a replica carriage door, which was developed and built by Crown Point technicians Stuart Lawler and Luke Greenfield with the intention to move towards a proper vehicle trial. NXEA Engineers Nigel Teulon and Jason

Mills also oversaw the project. Stuart Lawler commented; "The students demonstrated a high degree of engineering initiative and competence, which impressed the team at Crown Point and the train leasing company, Porterbrook. We hope they will consider the rail industry in the future, if they decide to pursue engineering as a career".

The students who took part in the project were Andy Knights, Matt Rudling, Ryan Frost and Tom Dougall. NXEA will be working with Wymondham High school students once again next year on a new electronics related project.

Discounted fares on Settle route in November

Discounts of up to 69% are being offered this winter for travel on the Settle & Carlisle line.

Northern Rail and Metro are offering anyone with a West Yorkshire MetroCard or Metro English National Concessionary Pass (ENCP) the opportunity to take advantage of the scheme. The special offer is a day return ticket for just £8 from Leeds, Bradford Forster Square or any intermediate Metro station on the Airedale Line, travelling to anywhere on the Leeds-Settle-Carlisle and Lancaster – Morecambe routes.

The offer runs from 3rd – 14th November inclusive. MetroCard holders can travel any day of the week and weekends and Metro ENCP holders can travel anytime from Monday to Friday. New station for Slattocks

Slattocks could have its own railway station under last minute changes to the congestion charge bid in Manchester.

A last minute alteration by Manchester City Council to revise Transport Innovation Fund (TIF) proposals to include the station were agreed on 31st October at a meeting of the Association of Greater Manchester Authorities (AGMA).

The heads of the 10 authorities that form Greater Manchester agreed to look into the feasibility of constructing a heavy rail line in the Slattocks area, as they meet to rubber stamp revised proposals to the TIF bid to invest £2.8 billion in public transport improvements in return for introducing a pay-as-you-drive scheme.

The decision came after it was revealed that Rochdale would receive an additional Metrolink option to the Kingsway Business Park, and that Heywood would also have a railway connection looked into, leaving Middleton with nothing but generic citywide improvements. Sir Richard Leese, speaking at the AGMA meeting said: "I would like to add a station at Slattocks to serve both the Stakehill Industrial Park, nearby Hopwood Hall College, and to provide some access to Middleton."

The Office of Rail regulation (ORR) has awarded Network Rail £26 billion in its five-year report published on 30th October, some £2.4 billion less than the operator had wanted.

A total of 19 projects have been scrapped or put on hold, one of them being plans to speed up the London to South Wales mainline when the Severn Tunnel is shut by restoring a single-track 12-mile section of line between Swindon and Kemble, which is the only diversionary route between South Wales and London when there is engineering work on the main line.

First Great Western says it is disappointed that the £32 million scheme to upgrade the route to a double line had not been approved as it means that passengers will still face journey times of an extra hour between South Wales and London at weekends and in the

evenings when the Severn Tunnel is closed. Also among the projects shelved were two in Cardiff to tackle future overcrowding on the city's commuter network, the Valleys Lines by speeding up the Ninian Park to Radyr line and the upgrade of Cogan junction. The Swindon to Kemble line was cut back to one line amid the Beeching cuts in 1968, when one track was taken up to save money on maintenance. Trains are currently forced to wait for services coming in the opposite direction, resulting in delays and restricting capacity.

Another victim of the cuts is a £25 million scheme to remodel a stretch of line at Redhill, intended to make journeys to London more reliable and less overcrowded. Some train services to and from London are currently slowed down by a 'pinch point' layout at Redhill.

ATOC urges train operators to contribute to NNSG

The Association of Train Operating Companies (ATOC) has said that the success of the National Networks Strategy Group, announced on 29th October by the Secretary of State for Transport, will depend upon the contribution that train operators can make to its work.

ATOC sees the establishment of the Group as a potentially positive development in addressing the vital need to add more capacity to cater for the predicted continued growth of the railway, and believes that a range of options for enhancing the network needs to be considered as a whole. This could include schemes that can be taken forward relatively quickly, as well as more medium- and long-term initiatives, such as extending electrification to significant parts of the network and building new lines.

Michael Roberts, Chief Executive of ATOC, said: "This is a good initiative in that it should allow us to think about various options in the round and to ensure that the costs and benefits of these options are properly considered. However, it is vital that train operating companies have a direct role in this work. Running 20,000 services a day gives these companies a deep understanding of passenger needs and future demand. These are key insights to ensuring the industry as a whole identifies the right priorities for investment. We have already been working directly with the Department for Transport on the case for electrification and with Network Rail on the future development of the railways. We look forward to playing a full part in this new initiative."

Matlock branch to be upgraded Upgrade for to take heavier trains

The Derwent Valley line from Matlock to Derby once had through trains from Matlock to London and was also used to host excursion trains from far afield.

However the condition of some bridges on the single line branch north of Ambergate has meant that for the last few years only lightweight diesel railcars have been able to access the line, East Midlands Class 222 Meridians being be too heavy for the line due to the weakness of the bridges.

Now Network Rail is to take action to remove the weight restrictions, starting this month. This will mean some closures of part of the line during the work from 9th to 14th November, when trains will run from Derby to Whatstandwell with a bus service from there to Matlock. The second phase will take place in the New Year, when bridges in the Matlock area will be tackled. This work is scheduled to take place from 17th to 24th January.

Nottingham

Major improvement work has been approved for Nottingham station in an effort to cut delays.

The Office of Rail Regulation (ORR) has agreed that Network Rail can spend £9.8 million on upgrading signals and adding a seventh platform. It is hoped that this will stop trains having to wait outside the station for a platform. Earlier this year the ORR approved £55 million to upgrade the line between London and the East Midlands.

Could trains run to Hunstanton once again?

West Norfolk Council is to look again at the idea of re-opening the Lynn to Hunstanton line that was closed as part of the Beeching cuts in 1969, despite being used by some 700 people a day in summer and 250 a day in winter.

Re-opening the route was last discussed in the 1990s, when there was much support for the idea in principle, except from the owners of homes or businesses built on or near the old line! Nowadays, the environmental case for reviving the line and

relieving road congestion in and around Hunstanton is considered to be even stronger.

One legacy from the line's past is the ornate station at Wolferton, where the platforms became a familiar transfer point for monarchs and their VIP guests before the three-mile carriage ride to Sandringham House. The Queen boarded the Royal Train there for the last time in 1966, and the station was closed three years later to become first a museum, and then restored to its Victorian splendour as four private houses.

Welcome to the age of the 21st century rubbish bin!

Rubbish bins could make a limited comeback on London Underground stations and city streets, due to a new type that have been built to withstand the blast of a terrorist's bomb.

The steel armour-plated bins have been developed to withstand at least 75% of a blast's force and contain the fireball resulting from an explosion. Hundreds of them are due to be installed through London's financial district next year after the British company behind them spent five years testing them to destruction in the Mexican desert. The bins are designed to have digital screens on the side that will relay news, financial and travel information to passers-by throughout the day. Bins were removed from the London Underground in February 1991 following an IRA blast in Victoria Station. Most were removed from the City the following year, and the last few were taken away after a large bomb left in a bin in Bishopsgate exploded in April 1993. Environmental groups have blamed the lack of bins for an increasing tide of litter across the country, but with each new bin costing £30,000 and weighing roughly a ton, it is unlikely they will be used in anything but the most sensitive locations!

Metronet staff to transfer to **Transport for** London

Metronet employees are set to transfer to Transport for London in December in a move that will mark the completion of TfL's takeover of the bankrupt Tube infrastructure company.

Some 6,000 Metronet staff are expected to go on to TfL's books, reassuring unions that workers' pension arrangements and other terms of employment will not be compromised under the new structure for upgrading the Tube.

Metronet, which was responsible for maintenance and upgrade work on nine London Underground lines, went into administration in July 2007 with TfL gaining control of its works programme in May this year.

The Week Ahead

A busier week than of late for railtours, commencing on 5th November with a VSOE British Pullman working from London Victoria to Bath and Bristol.

The train is due to feature No. 35028 Clan Line from Victoria via Salisbury to Westbury, where the train will continue diesel-hauled. Steam takes over again at Westbury on the return, back to Victoria via Newbury, Reading and Staines.

Two steam-hauled tours are scheduled for 8th November, and as reported elsewhere in this issue, Tyseley's 'Castle' No. 5043 Earl of Mount Edgcumbe was officially certified for mainline use on 30th October and will double-head Vintage Trains Solihull to Didcot return working with stablemate No. 4965 Rood Ashton Hall, which will also be the 'Hall's' penultimate mainline outing prior to withdrawal for overhaul. The Railway Touring Company offer 'A4' Pacific No. 60007 Sir Nigel Gresley on its 'Cheshireman' from Scarborough, picking up at Malton, York, Wakefield Kirkgate and Huddersfield. The train proceeds across the Standedge route to Chester, via Warrington, with steam operating as far as Crewe on the return.

The Branch Line Society is operating a tour to North Blyth on 8th November, which originates at Finsbury Park. Using EWS Class 66s in 'top and tail' mode, the charter is due to visit many of the lines in the area including Bedlington, Cambois and North Blyth Alcan (to the Network Rail limit). Land cruises head north over the border at Easter!

The Scottish land cruise market has become very popular with tour operators in recent years for many reasons, but without question, and especially in the current economic climate, the main one being that a full train is very profitable.

So it is perhaps not surprising that Easter 2009 has four on offer, three of which will be operating between Good Friday, 10th April and Easter Monday 13th April. Two operators, Pathfinder and Past Time Rail, go head to head for part of their pick up route as the former starts at Salisbury and picks up along the Avon Valley before heading to Birmingham and then to Crewe via Shrewsbury, while the latter also picks up at Shrewsbury and Crewe, having previously travelled north from Taunton to Gloucester and then via Lydney and the Welsh Marches.

Pathfinders' 'West Highlander' operates to Fort William, Mallaig and Oban while Past Times'

'Scottish Chieftain' covers Oban, Ayr and Stranraer, with the bonus of a run over the Settle & Carlisle on the way home.

The third operator is UK Railtours, whose proprietor John Farrow was responsible for pioneering these trips with Hertfordshire Railtours. Its trip operates from London King's Cross along the traditional charter path to Doncaster, where the tour diverges from the East Coast for a northbound run over the Settle & Carlisle and onwards to overnight in Glasgow. Fort William and Ardrosson Harbour (for a trip to the Isle of Arran) are the main features, with an added bit of spice being the opportunity for a rare chance to traverse the freight-only branch from Ayr to Chalmerston and, of course, also making its way around Scotland from 9th April will be the Railway Touring Company's mammoth 'Great Britain II', whose provisional locomotive rosters are available below.

'Champion' to Kyle in 2009

The highlight of Pathfinders' recently released provisional programme for 2009 has to be the weekend excursion planned for 'Western' No. D1015 Western Champion to Inverness and the Kyle of Lochalsh.

The plan is to run from Bristol via Birmingham and the West Coast Main Line through to Inverness on Friday 19th June, which will be followed by a more leisurely day to Kyle of Lochalsh on 20th June, before the return south on the following day. An intensive three days does seem to be somewhat of an understatement!

Other tours utilising No. D1015 are proposed for 12th September to Blaenau Ffestiniog and 31st October to Buxton and Hindlow. Branch lines also feature strongly with visits to freight lines in the north-west on 24th January, Scottish freight lines on 8th February, the Rylestone branch on 7th March, South Wales freight lines on 28th March and Hamworthy and Fawley on 23rd/24th May (in conjunction with Eastleigh Works Open Day).

- Class 86 No. 86259 Les Ross is booked to haul a charter to Manchester Piccadilly being organised by Birmingham-based local radio station BBC WM in aid of it's appeal on behalf of 'The Kidney Kid's', which is looking to raise £1.5 million to provide a new kidney unit at Birmingham's Children's Hospital. Les Ross himself, fellow BBC WM presenter Ed Doolan and Father Christmas will be travelling with the train, which is booked to pick up at Birmingham New Street, Tame Bridge Parkway and Wolverhampton. Vintage Trains is taking the bookings on 0121 708 4960 and fares range from £39 adult return to £99 premier dining. Birmingham New Street to Manchester Piccidilly was prime Class 86 territory back in those pre-Voyager days.
- ❖ Spitfire Railtours says that due to operational reasons, Network Rail has advised that its 29th November charter from Poole cannot be routed to York and Newcastle. Instead the tour will set down at Manchester Victoria and continue for an afternoon in Blackpool. A local fare of £20 adult and £10 child for a return trip from Manchester Victoria to Blackpool North.WCRC Class 37s are the booked traction.
- Tyseley's newly restored Castle No. 5043 Earl of Mount Edgcumbe gained its mainline certificate on 30th October after an early morning 'light engine' test run to Stratfordupon-Avon, and a loaded test run in the afternoon that featured four coaches and Class 47 No. 47773 on the rear. Running main line via Hatton in each direction, the loco was worked up to its maximum speed of 75mph, culminating in a rousing and noisy climb through Snow Hill tunnel, which enlivened the early evening for hundreds of commuters! The loco becomes the eighth and last engine of the Tyseley collection to gain a mainline certificate, the fourth 'Castle' they have outshopped, and the 12th locomotive to be overhauled at the works for mainline operations.

The end of the current timetable should see the end of Class 508 usage in Kent by Southeastern, and a railtour featuring the class will hopefully be organised for 13th December. The plan is to run from London Victoria via Beckenham to London Bridge, and then via East Croydon and Tunbridge Wells to Hastings for a break. The return will take in Maidstone West, Strood, Sheerness-on-Sea, Sittingbourne and back to London Victoria via Herne Hill. At the moment, expressions of interest are required, and if there is sufficient interest more details will follow. To express interest go to http://www.508farewell.co.uk

RTC announce loco line-up for Great Britain II


The Railway Touring Company has announced the provisional locomotive roster for its 'Great Britain II' next year.

The train starts at London Victoria on 6th April, running to Bristol Temple Meads with No. 34067 Tangmere. Next day, after a diesel-hauled trip to Penzance, Nos. 5029 Nunney Castle and 70013 Oliver Cromwell are positioned to return the tour to Bristol, and then on 8th April continue to Preston via Hereford with No. 70013 alone.

Maybe the highlight is from Preston to Glasgow Central on 9th April, which could well be the first time a 'Royal Scot' has covered the route throughout in 45 years, when No. 46115 Scots Guardsman takes over the train. Two 'Black 5s' Nos. 45231 & 45407 are then in the frame to cover the run to Inverness on 10th April, with one of the 'Black 5s' being joined by Class K4 No. 61994 The Great Marquess for a return working to Kyle of Lochalsh on the following day.

The return south is booked via Aberdeen, again with the two 'Black 5s' to Edinburgh Waverley on 12th April, with the final steam leg to York being scheduled for No. 60009 *Union of South Africa* on 13th April. The final section back to London will be diesel hauled.

Commuter service for East Lancs as congestion charge looms?

The East Lancashire Railway is to be brought into use as a commuter service to Manchester as part of congestion charge plans.

Commuters in Rossendale will be able to catch a train from Rawtenstall through to Heywood and on to the city centre under Greater Manchester's congestion charging scheme. The decision to introduce Manchester congestion charges will be decided by residents of Greater Manchester in a referendum to be held in December. As part of the changes, bus fares will also be capped and will be simplified so that there is a standard charge for short journeys, and another for other trips.

More diesel operation for the Great Central Railway in 2009

The Great Central Railway (GCR) timetables for 2009 are being finalised, but it is expected that the 12.15 train will be diesel hauled all year round (except at special events as advertised), the duty being shared between the fleet.

Class 27 No. D5401 has now returned to the GCR, with the intention that it becomes part of the home fleet. One of the ex-Irish Railway's steam heat vans is in the final stages of commissioning. This will allow it to actually run in the train, which means that for the first time ever at the GCR, diesel services can be steam-heated.

With this in mind, the 12.15 train will run diesel-hauled even in the low season (Jan / Feb / Mar / Nov 2009). The railway is also adding an additional diesel running event for the 2009 timetable. It will take place over the weekend of 10th / 11th January, featuring three (or possibly four) diesels from the home fleet running amid a steam service. The GCR is hoping that diesel enthusiasts will support the extra event and the 12.15 train throughout the year.
